Priscilla Coatney Family


Shannon, Priscilla's oldest daughter, graduated from


This summer he is enrolled in the reading program at the Robbins


Oh, they do leave Saturday-Monday open for their loving hubbies Herman and William. "What would you like dear?"


And now for the latest on Walter Davis' first (does someone out there know something that I don't know?) grandson Walter Leon and the Mays Revolution:

There were verbal, musical and dance tributes; a film of Mateen's life; drummers; an incredible meal and everyone up on their feet for a "second line" in the New Orleans tradition. What a celebration!


The New Year has brought many adjustments. With support from family and friends, we are slowly moving through the grieving process, knowing that life goes on.

degrees to go!" He survived, did very well academically and is looking forward to his return in the Fall. He's studying to become a journalist.


Accomplishments:

We started preparing for the marathon in August with a special training program that gradually increased walking times and distance. 

With the marathon behind them, Adena's and Alice's amateur days are over. They have taken up race-walking as a sport and are training with a coach to compete as part of a team.


Travel:

A Few Black History Facts On May 11, 1976, the Villa Lewaro in Greenburgh, New York, was designated a national historic landmark. Villa Lewaro had been the home of African-American millionaire Madame C. J. Walker. The 32-room Italian-style mansion located on the Hudson River in Irvington, was built before World War I at a cost of \$250,000 enormously expensive for the time. The home was designed and built by Vertner Woodson Tandy, the first African-American architect to be registered in the state of New York.

On the first of January 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, bringing it into force on this day. The document declared that slaves in states that had rebelled against the Union were "then, thenceforward, and forever free," and provided for African-American soldiers to enlist in the Union Army and Navy during the Civil War.

Crowds in the North had waited with anticipation the signing of the Proclamation, which ignited what was known as the Year of Jubilee.

May 7th

"Campaigning in Free Verse," an article about Jesse Jackson's bid for the 1984 Democratic presidential nomination, appeared in the May 7, 1984 issue of Time magazine. Jackson was the first African-American to be taken seriously as a contender for a major political party nomination. In the 1984 primary elections, lackson received 2.5 million black votes and 800,000 non-black votes, which included 10 percent of the total white primary vote. He ran again in 1988, this time garnering 20 percent of the white primary vote. Presidential scholar James Barber said (in the words of author Robert C. Smith): "While the other candidates were making news, Jackson was making history."

January 13th

On this day in 1966, Dr. Robert Weaver was appointed by President Linden B. Johnson to head the newly created Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).



Weaver was the first
African-American in history to serve
in a presidential cabinet. "I want
the job," Weaver was known to
have said to insiders, "but damn if
I'll ask for it!" As the director of
HUD, Weaver oversaw 9,000
employees and approximately \$4.5
billion in annual expenditures.

March 30th

The 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which had been ratified on February 3, went into effect on this day in 1870. The amendment extended the right to vote to all males, regardless of "race, color, or previous condition of servitude." The next day Thomas Peterson became the first African-American to exercise his new constitutional right.

May 17th

On this day in 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court handed down its decision in the historical case of Brown vs. Board of Education of

Topeka. Chief Justice Earl B. Warren read the Court's decision"

Does segregation of children in public schools solely on the base of race, even though the physical facilities and other "tangible" factors may be equal, deprive the children of the minority group of equal education opportunities?

On **January 2,1990**, David Norman Dinkins began his first day as mayor of New York City with a 7:00 a.m. appearance on NBC-TV's Today show. After defeating former mayor Ed Koch in the September Democratic primaries and then, by a small margin, beating Republican Rudolph Guiliani in the general election, Dinkins had become the first African-American mayor of America's largest city.
